
STUDYING G. I. GURDJIEFF: SCHOLARS AND PRACTITIONERS IN CONVERSATION A Symposium, 3 December 2019



George Ivanovitch Gurdjieff (c. 1866-1949) is one of three foundational figures of modern "secularized" esotericism, yet he is far less studied than Helena Petrovna Blavatsky (1831-1891), co-founder of the Theosophical Society, and Rudolf Steiner (1851-1925), founder of Anthroposophy. Much of Gurdjieff's biography is speculative, and his teaching (the "Fourth Way", or the "Work") is contested in terms of its sources (Christian, Sufi, Traditionalism), and its classification (religion, spirituality, esotericism, psychology). "Insider" accounts of varying inflection continue to dominate publications about Gurdjieff. With the exception of a small number of publications, the analysis of Gurdjieff within the Study of Religion/s is an emergent field. This symposium contributes to this new wave in the study of Gurdjieff, and it approaches its subject within the historical, comparative and theoretical concerns of the academy. The purpose is a more complete analysis, including Gurdjieff's sources and teaching techniques, key texts and contexts for communicating the "message", and orthodox and heterodox continuations of the Gurdjieff teaching after his death. The Movements, and the music Gurdjieff composed with Thomas de Hartmann (1885-1956), will be featured; these demonstrate the importance of dialogue between scholars and practitioners.
